THE PLANE FINALLY REACHED ITS DESTINATION

A Pastor once travelling in a plane describes a beautiful episode. It was a long fight and there was the sign of a storm, and all were asked to fasten their seat belts. Then, after a while, a calm voice of the Pilot said, "We shall not be serving the beverages at this time as we are expecting a little turbulence. Please be sure your seat belt is fastened." The Pastor looked around the aircraft to see many of the passengers were becoming apprehensive. Later, the voice of the announcer said, "We are so sorry that we are unable to serve the meal at this time. The turbulence is still ahead of us." And then the storm broke. The ominous cracks of thunder could be heard even above the roar of the engines. Lightening lit up the darkening skies, and within moments that great plane was like a cork tossed around on a celestial ocean. One moment the airplane was lifted on terrific currents of air; the next, it dropped as if it were about to crash. The pastor confessed that he shared the discomfort and fear of those around him. As he looked around the plane, he could see that nearly all the passengers were upset and alarmed and some started praying. Then he saw a girl to whom the storm meant nothing. She had tucked her feet beneath her as she sat on her seat and was reading a book. Everything within her small world was calm and orderly. Sometimes she closed her eyes, then she would read again; then she would straighten her legs but worry and fear were not in her world. The plane finally reached its destination, and all the passengers were hurrying to disembark, he lingered to speak to the girl whom he had watched for such a long time. Having commented about the storm and asked her why she had not been afraid. The sweet child replied, "Sir, my dad is the pilot, and he is taking me home."

I SPOKE TO HIM AS A BROTHER

A TIME magazine issue in 1984 presented a startling cover. It pictured a prison cell where two men sat on metal folding chairs. The young man wore a blue turtleneck sweater, blue jeans and white running shoes. The older man was dressed in a white robe and had a white skullcap on his head. They sat facing one another, up-close and personal. They spoke quietly so as to keep others from hearing the conversation.

The young man was Mehmet Ali Agca, the pope's would-be assassin (he shot and wounded the Pope on May 13, 1981); the other man was Pope St. John Paul II, the intended victim. The Pope held the hand that had held the gun whose bullet had torn into the Pope's body. This was a living icon of mercy. John Paul's forgiveness was deeply Christian. His deed with Ali Agca spoke a thousand words. He embraced his enemy and pardoned him.

At the end of their 20-minute meeting, Ali Agca raised the Pope's hand to his forehead as a sign of respect. John Paul shook Ali Agca's hand tenderly. When the Pope left the cell he said, "What we talked about must remain a secret between us. I spoke to him as a brother whom I have pardoned and who has my complete trust."

This is an example of God's Divine Mercy, the same Divine Mercy whose message St. Faustina witnessed.

READINGS AND LITURGY

Acts 4.32-35; Psalm 118.2-4, 16-18, 22-24; 1 John 5.1—6; Gospel: John 20.19-31.

The first reading describes how the early community of believers held everything in common. In the second reading, John writes that to love God is to keep his commandments, and that faith in Jesus conquers the world. In the Gospel, Jesus appears to the disciples in a locked room and breathes on them, giving them the power to forgive sins.

Divine Mercy Sunday Reflection by Fr. Dunstan

This Sunday is known as "Divine Mercy" Sunday, as instituted by St. John Paul II, following the revelation of Jesus to Saint Faustina. Who is Saint Faustina? Saint Faustina was a nun in Poland during the 1930s. She received revelations, or messages from Jesus, which she recorded in notebooks. Some messages that Saint Faustina received from Jesus were: - that Jesus loves each and every soul, and would like to attract all the souls to heaven, - that all the souls are not giving the proper respect to Jesus, in the form of Eucharist, because of their sins, and \square that the people do not fully trust that Jesus came to Earth, and died for the sins of the whole world. What is "Divine Mercy?" You've probably seen the images of Jesus, where there are two rays, one red and one white, coming out of his heart. This is the image of the Divine Mercy. The red ray represents the Blood of Christ for the life of souls, or the justification for life and the white, or pale ray, represents Water, for the forgiveness for souls. Both of these elements also appear when Jesus is pierced by a soldier at the foot of the cross. Through this revelation, we are taught by Jesus to pray for mercy from our own sins and for the sins of the whole world. We pray for the conversion of sinners, and for every soul, that they may attain heaven and obtain sanctification and holiness. The Prayer: The hour of Divine Mercy is 3:00pm - when Jesus died on the cross. It is also encouraged to say the Divine Mercy at 3:00pm. While there is a Divine Mercy chaplet that uses the rosary, the most important take away is to think and say (hopefully at 3:00pm), "Jesus, I Trust in You. Have mercy on us and on the whole world." This puts us in the presence of God and allows us to think and participate in the Divine Mercy. If you are able to do the chaplet, a good idea would be to do the chaplet as a Novena. A novena is "a nine day period of private or public prayer to obtain special graces, to implore special favours, or make special petitions." This is usually said first from Good Friday, all the way to the following Saturday, which culminates to Divine Mercy Sunday. This can then be restarted on the first Friday of every month, for the next nine days, culminating on the following Sunday. Practicing the Divine Mercy enhances the belief that we ourselves will have a peaceful death and the assurances of heavenly birth, when we die. I encourage you to try the Divine Mercy. It will be food, for your soul, and a light for your life. Amen. May God Bless

How to Pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet

- 1. Make the Sign of the Cross.
- 2. On the first Our Father bead: Optional opening prayer: "You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty Yourself out upon us."

Repeat three times: "O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fountain of Mercy for us, I trust in You!"

- 3. On the first three Hail Mary beads: Pray the Our Father, Hail Mary, and the Apostles' Creed:
- 4. On the next Our Father bead (or the centerpiece), pray: "Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.
- 5. On the ten Hail Mary beads, pray:

'For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world."

- 6. Repeat 4 and 5 for all five decades.

7. At the conclusion of all five decades, pray: "Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world." (Repeat three times)

Optional closing prayer:

"Éternal God, in Whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion-inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase Your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit ourselves to Your holy will, which is Love and Mercy itself. Amen."

8. Finish with the Sign of the Cross.
